

# The Drive to play: A DIR Perspective Using Play and Relationship-Based Techniques to Achieve your Treatment Goals

**Course Description:** 

Play is the portal through which young children are afforded access to a vast array of developmental opportunities. Play occurs spontaneously without the need for an imposed task and is a therapeutic modality applicable across disciplines.

This day is devoted to the discovery of play in developmental context and the applications of play as a treatment modality across disciplines. The first part of the morning will focus on the functions of play, the typical developmental course of play over the first 5- years and how play serves to support the formation of self- regulation itself. Play as self-healing is illustrated by a video documenting the dramatic developmental advances made by a class of children with emotional disorders through open-ended play with basic materials.

The second half of the morning begins with an introduction to DIR Model (Developmental. Individual-difference. Relationship-based) approach to intervention with autism and other developmental disorders by Serena Weider, cocreator of DIR with the late Stanley Greenspan. The morning session concludes with a more in-depth examination and illustration of "D" the "I" and the" R" and Floortime, the play and relationship-based treatment modality of DIR, applicable across disciplines.

The second half of the day is totally devoted to the clinical application of play in occupational therapy, specifically, and across therapies. Two cases will be presented, one of which will have a multi-disciplinary perspective. The cases will be illustrated with video clips and vignette, analyzed and deconstructed to illustrate clinical reasoning and process using play and relationship-based methodology including DIR. Audience questions and discussion will be encouraged.

Foley, Ed.D., IMH-E (IV-C) serves as Consulting Clinical Psychologist at the New York Center for Child Development (NYCCD) in New York City and Clinical Co-Director of the New York City Early Childhood Mental Health Training and Technical Assistance Center (TTAC): a collaboration between NYCCD and McSilver Institute, New York University. He is also Director of the Graduate Personnel Preparation Program in Infant Mental Health and Developmental Practice at the Adelphi University Institute for Parenting, Garden City, NY. He is a



Senior Faculty member of the Profectum DIR Academy and is Endorsed as an Infant Mental Health Clinical Mentor. Dr. Foley is a retired tenured faculty member of Ferkauf Graduate School of Psychology where he taught for 20 years in the Department of School-Clinical Child Psychology and coordinated the infancy-early childhood track. As Senior Clinical Supervisor in the Department of Pediatrics at NYU School of Medicine-Bellevue Hospital Center, he was an innovator in the technique of reflective supervision. While serving as the Chief Psychologist in the Pediatric Department of the Medical College of Pennsylvania, Dr. Foley completed a fellowship at the Yale Child Study Center with the late, Sally Provence M.
