Sign up for the Highmark Walk



### A Tribute to William Gasdaska

Recently I saw the movie, "As Good As It Gets." In one of my favorite scenes, a socially awkward Jack Nicholson finally pays a heartfelt compliment to Helen Hunt by saying, "You make me want to be a better man." When I heard that line, I immediately thought of my Dad; and the more I reflect on his life, the more I find myself whispering that same prayer up to him.

One of Dad's many superpowers was his ability to see things not as they were, but as they could be. When he crystallized that vision, he turned it into a reality. He loved a good challenge and when he encountered hardship, he didn't complain or give up. Instead, he cleverly played the cards he was dealt and frequently finished with a winning hand. "That patch of dirt could be a perfect vegetable garden ... that dollar could multiply tenfold if invested the right way ... my daughter could walk, if she only had the right help."

He saw a better future for his infant daughter, who was challenged by both spina bifida and hydrocephalus. He sought out Easter Seals, who willingly



provided my sister, MaryEllen, with the much needed physiotherapy and equipment that supported her rehab. MaryEllen would never have achieved her level of personal success without the aid of Easter Seals. The organization fueled our family's efforts to help Mary achieve her full potential and we felt an overwhelming sense of gratitude towards them.

Dad knew we could never repay Easter Seals for the financial, physical and

emotional support they provided following MaryEllen's countless surgeries; but as I said, he relished a challenge. When he channeled his inner Gasdaska — he saw a path forward that would fuel Easter Seals' future. By championing the MaryEllen Golf Tournament, he developed a means to provide ongoing support to the organization that provided so much assistance to our sister and family.

#### **Meet Althea!**



Althea started receiving physical therapy from Easter Seals when she was just 10 months old. Her parents were growing

increasingly

concerned that she wasn't strong enough to pick herself up on her hands and knees. They knew that without that strength, she would not be able to crawl, a critical developmental stage that leads to walking. They were also concerned that Althea did not like "tummy time," also very important for physical development. When her parents helped her change positions, Althea did not like it - and let her parents know! These challenges meant that Althea was very limited in her ability to explore her environment, which was a major concern as this type of exploration is how infants and toddlers learn and develop.

With the introduction of physical and occupational therapy, Althea began to steadily get stronger and became more accepting of changes to her position. Easter Seals helped her parents learn how they could help Althea, incorporating activities into her typical play and other routines to make her strong. For example, we met Althea and her family at the playground, so

that mom and dad could learn how to use playground equipment to work on her sensory challenges, and build strength, balance and coordination. We didn't tell Althea this was therapy – she was just having fun!

Althea has blossomed into a curious, active toddler who loves her gym class, trips to the playground and playing outside at home.

Althea's mom Becky says, "I can't believe the change in Althea over the last year. She has gone from scared and overwhelmed by most situations and new experiences, to a really happy, pleasant, funny child who talks, interacts and plays with other children. The relief we feel at her happiness can't be measured."
