Easterseals Regional Medical & Autism Diagnostic Clinic

For families concerned about their child's development our diagnostic team provides a series of thorough evaluations carefully chosen to provide a comprehensive picture of each child. The diagnosis of developmental concerns, including Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD), is a complex process. Easterseals uses the gold standard method of diagnosis recognized by the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry.

Our clinic is uniquely designed to meet the needs of children and families:

- •We provide at least eight hours of intensive one on one evaluations spaced out over four different days for more than just a "one time snapshot" of child's abilities
- •We have an Autism Coordinator who is the point of contact throughout the entire process
- •We have a pediatrician as part of our team so the child receives a medical diagnosis
- •The entire team meets with the family to explain the diagnosis and recommendations
- •We provide follow up services through our Medical Consult Clinic, family support services and outpatient rehab therapies

AAC EVALUATIONS



Easterseals Joliet Region has begun offering AAC Evaluations! AAC is short for augmentative and alternative communication which is a method of communication that involves all forms of communication (other than oral speech) that are used to express thoughts, needs, wants, and ideas.



WHO?

Any person who is unable to reliably use verbal speech to communicate.

WHAT?

Any no-tech (pointing, signing), low-tech (picture book, core board), or high-tech (voice output device) communication is considered AAC.

WHY?

Communication is a fundamental human right. AAC is a powerful, meaningful tool.

Why Your Child Repeats Things: Echolalia

What is echolalia?

What does it mean when your child keeps repeating words, phrases or sounds? This is called echolalia. Children may do this when they do not know how to effectively communicate or lack communication skills. Many times, echolalia is used to practice or learn language. Repetitive speech is common for children in their early childhood and also common for children with autism or developmental delays to carry it further into their childhood.

There are several different reasons why your child keeps repeating words, phrases or sounds. For example:

- They may be using it as a sensory outlet or way to calm themselves when they get anxious or upset.
- It could be used as a form of communication when it is too difficult for them to form their own words or ideas.
- They may be trying to take their first steps of communication.
- They are exploring a form of 'self-talk' or talking to oneself when experiencing difficulty or frustration.

Types of echolalia

There are several different types of echolalia and each play a particular role in a child's way of communicating or learning how to communicate.

Immediate

Oftentimes, echolalia can be an immediate response. An example of this would be, "Lauren, do you want a snack?" and Lauren responds, "Want a snack." In this case, Lauren is immediately echoing the language spoken to her to communicate that she wants a snack or is hungry.

Delayed

Similarly, Lauren may repeat a phrase or song from a show earlier in the day, as a way to respond to a situation that reminds her of that show. This delayed response may seem as though it does not relate to the situation at hand, but in fact, it is her way of making sense of the situation and using her own way of communicating.

Non-functional

For some kids, echolalia may be the repetition of meaningless sounds. This would be considered a form of non-functional echoing. A child may be able to reiterate words or phrases, but have no understanding of what they are saying. For example, a child may be able to reiterate an entire scene from their favorite show, but has no understanding of the characters or events happening. This can cause confusion and can be misleading to parents as they think their child understands more than they do.

Functional

When a child uses functional echolalia, however, they use memorized words or phrases in a purposeful way. For example, a child watches a commercial for cookies and later on when they get hungry, they repeat the word "cookies" in the same tone or accent, in order to communicate that they are hungry.



<u>Home Energy Assistance Program and Percentage of Income Payment</u> Plan (PIPP)

The Will County Center for Community Concerns (WCCCC), as administrator of the Home Energy Assistance Program helps income-eligible households with their utility bills and furnace assistance. Assistance is available to household's whose 30-day gross income is at or below 200% of the poverty level. Assistance for utilities will be available from July 27, 2020 through May 31, 2021, or until funds have been exhausted, whichever comes first.

Safe Families seeks to come alongside parents in crisis and help them get on their feet by providing a family friend and mentor to support them and/or short-term care for their children for as little as a couple days to several months.

Intake Line: 217-361-4964

- Safe Families is NOT a foster care or adoption service.
- Parents maintain full custody of their children when they are in temporary care and can request their return at any time.
- Parents have regular visits and contact with their children.
- Children ages 0-18 years old can be hosted, including parenting teens.
- Children can be hosted for as short as a couple of days to several months.
- Safe Families is committed to reuniting parents and children as soon as possible.
