For generations, Easterseals Midwest has been helping thousands of families, children, and adults with disabilities access programs designed to enrich their lives and empower independence. This past year alone, we supported **nearly 6,000 people** through an assortment of programs, services, and supports. We also made it our goal to better educate community leaders, legislators, and the general public about disabilities and the disability community.

The heart of this work is advocacy. As you'll read in this report, FY22 was a turning point for this work. We mobilized **hundreds of grassroots advocates**, including people we support, families, friends, and volunteers, to educate state legislators. 



MEET JYRA

Jyra was diagnosed with autism at a young age. Today, Jyra is able to communicate using a Language Acquisition Motor Planning (LAMP) Device, but this wasn't always the case.

For many years, Jyra struggled to express herself and to be heard. Although it was apparent from the beginning of Jyra's therapies that she could read some numbers and letters, she didn't show this skill consistently.

The turning point for Jyra came one day during a Music Therapy Session at Easterseals. What began as a simple exercise to assess her interest in some new material turned into a pathway to better connect Jyra's caregivers to her. While interacting with some letter cards and wooden letter blocks, Jyra began arranging the letters, and organized them perfectly from A to Z. She then used her LAMP device to communicate each letter perfectly.

This was a crucial moment in understanding Jyra; connecting her LAMP device to the activity she was performing. Breakthroughs continued after that session. In the following Music Therapy session, Jyra grabbed a small wooden bee and used her LAMP device to communicate "one." Then grabbing a second, she communicated "two." She continued adding blocks and counting, all the way to 10.

Jyra has since continued to expand her communication skills and connections to those around her. Now, at eight years old, is engaging in two-way communication. She can express her needs and wants.

Her communication is still blooming, and we look forward to unlocking even more tools for Jyra to use to participate fully in the world around her.



MEET NICHOLAS

In March, Nicholas and his family came to Easterseals for help.

Like many children with autism, Nicholas often displayed dangerous behaviors. Unable to control, monitor, or even express their emotions, children with autism can become overwhelmed, and often communicate that through aggression. Nicholas was aggressive toward himself and others and would often break things around him. Often his sister had to be kept away from him out of fear he would harm himself or her.

Once they entered therapy at Easterseals, our autism specialists began by developing a behavior support plan designed specifically for Nicholas. In the months since, Nicholas has made leaps and bounds with his behavior. He greets and plays with his peers, participates in circle time, and interacts with his autism specialists and family all in a safer manner. Nicholas' parents have reported many firsts for him, like his first trip to the grocery store, bedtime stories with both him and his sister, riding a scooter, and even using a fork. Things that we may take for granted are grand milestones for Nicholas and his family.

"I am so, so grateful that I made the decision to get him off the waiting list, even if I wasn't initially sure how we would get him there each day," Nicholas's mother said. "He is finally thriving."

We can't wait to see even more firsts for Nicholas.



Program Spotlight | Employment

Kansas Program & Support Expansion

Easterseals is proud to provide services in every county in the state of Missouri, but we know there is much more work to be done to ensure that all residents in our territory have access to our full range of programs and services.

In 2018, we assumed programming responsibilities from a former Easterseals affiliate in Kansas, adding this territory to our service area. Until this year, we've primarily served Kansas residents living in or near Kansas

City. Throughout 2022, we worked closely with Kansas county and state funders, provider associations, self-advocates, parent groups, and higher education institutes to address the significant unmet need within the state, particularly among rural communities.

We hope to finalize contracts with several Kansas state funding agencies soon, and have set the goal of providing programming to at least 100 people with disabilities in Kansas in 2023.

MEET STILLFONE

Stillfone began receiving Community Living Services with Easterseals in 2016. Part of this program is determining individual goals and receiving the support necessary to reach them. When Stillfone joined Community Living, his main goal was to find and keep a competitive job.

Before our services, Stillfone had been employed but struggled with the social skills he needed to keep a job. In 2018, Stillfone enrolled in our Pre-Employment Program. There, Stillfone practiced social skills, learned the difference in professional versus social demeanors, and received Behavior Therapy.

By 2021, Stillfone was ready to try again. When he was establishing his goals for the year he told his team, "I'm ready to make my own money, support myself, and become more independent." Stillfone's Pre-Employment training was put into action, and he began applying for jobs that interested him.

In February of 2022, he was offered a job at McDonald's. Starting out, Stillfone worked two days a week completing food preparation and cleaning the store. After just one month of employment, his supervisor noted his hard work and added another day to his schedule.

Stillfone's commitment to his goal, along with the help and support of his Community Living and Pre-Employment teams, has led Stillfone one step closer to reaching his ultimate goal becoming independent and self-supporting.

Program Spotlight | Community Living

Self-Determination in Action

Historically, people with disabilities have limited control over their lives. Parents, guardians, agencies, and funding may dictate everything from where a person lives to what kind of job they have, their roommates, or how they spend their time and money. The Self-Determination in Action Project focuses on a core truth: when people with disabilities advocate for themselves and their rights, it builds public awareness and makes change possible.

Since the program was founded in 2021, Easterseals has supported over 300 people with disabilities to become self-advocates. Over the last year, we have expanded these efforts regionally to include Springfield, Joplin, and St. Joseph, Missouri.

Last year, self-advocates provided 10 community presentations to more than 1,000 people across Missouri to educate others on the importance of the program. We also launched three regional Individual Engagement Committees in St. Louis, Kansas City, and the southwest region. Each committee is made up of and governed by people with disabilities so they have power, voice, and authority to influence and promote inclusive and person-centered practices at Easterseals.

In 2023, our goal is to engage 500 people in the program by the end of the calendar year.

MEET LEONARD

We believe that everyone has a right to a warm, safe place to call home. In 2016, that wasn't the case for Leonard. Leonard was homeless, and in immediate danger of losing his bed at the homeless shelter because of his behavior.

Easterseals was called to help Leonard better understand the shelter's rules, and the consequences of not following them. After his spot was once again secure, our staff got to work finding Leonard a more permanent housing solution.

The first step was helping Leonard obtain the documents required to receive assistance. It took planning and hard work, but in less than a year, Leonard was receiving state support and had a housing voucher. With these new resources, Leonard was able to get an apartment of his own.

As excited as Leonard was with his newfound freedom, he was still struggling. Leonard has a big heart, and his dedication to giving back to those around him is unmatched. Unfortunately, his generous spirit was often taken advantage of by people around him. He was giving away the money he needed to sustain himself and was letting old friends and acquaintances stay with him. He soon was forced to move after two of these guests brought bed bugs into his home.



Leonard's team knew something had to change. So they asked him, when he moved to his new apartment, what was the single most important thing to him.

The answer? A roommate.

So the search began. It didn't take long for our team to find someone who they thought would be the perfect fit for Leonard. And with help from a grant, the community pitching in, and staff donations, Leonard left his bed-bug ridden apartment and his old ways behind.

Today, Leonard is thriving. He and his roommate get along great. The pair have become close friends with a few other guys living close by, and they often get together to hang out. Leonard pays all of his bills early. While he's still known to gift anything extra to friends and family in need, he makes sure his needs are met first.

Leonard also enjoys giving back to the community he came from. Every Friday, Leonard makes and hands out peanut butter and jelly sandwiches to the homeless. During heat advisories, he goes to homeless hotspots and delivers water. He also often delivers baked goods to the shelter near his apartment. Leonard's journey has led him full-circle, from needing help to get off the streets to helping those whose place he was once in.

Program Spotlight | Community Living

Reducing Health Disparities through Technology

Despite improvements in recent years, people with developmental disabilities continue to have shorter life expectancy and suffer more often from chronic conditions like heart disease and diabetes. Tragically, the COVID-19 pandemic put these disparities into sharp focus. People with disabilities suffered a much higher rate of COVID-related hospitalization and death.

Easterseals has been leading the way to explore innovations and supports that will help combat these issues. Last year, Easterseals expanded our use of the disability-focused telehealth platform StationMD. We also hired a Medical Director and Health Services Director to provide additional medical expertise and oversight to our staff.

Already, StationMD has proved to be a life-saving tool for individuals we serve. By accessing healthcare remotely, individuals have faster access to care and are able to avoid the risks of an emergency room visit. In fact, we've seen a 93% reduction in emergency room visits since we implemented the program. When individuals are referred to a doctor or hospital, the StationMD physician is able to facilitate their care and ensure proper follow-up care is provided when they come home.

StationMD is just one of many tools that Easterseals can use to help individuals we support live healthier, more independent lives.

In an effort to combat the ongoing Direct Support Professional (DSP) Workforce Crisis, Easterseals created and implemented the Be More campaign, an advertising campaign designed to attract new employees.

The campaign centered on Earning More, Growing More, Being More at Easterseals, invites individuals of all work backgrounds to learn about the various positions offered at Easterseals. Straying from the general "Now Hiring" approach, the campaign highlights specific positions, highlighting an overview of what each position entails.

The award-winning campaign scales across all social media platforms, using static Facebook and Instagram ads, video Facebook and Instagram ads, and billboards. Launching in July and running through November, this campaign increased website traffic to the careers page by nearly 20% compared to the previous year.

In addition to raising wages, we are making changes within our organization to provide additional support to staff. In FY22 we implemented a new supervisor structure in our Community Living division as well as a new face-to-face onboarding process to make sure new staff have the tools and support they need during their first 90 days at Easterseals.

Advocacy in Action

It's crucial for us to educate our legislators about the needs of the disability community and the essential workforce behind them. In FY22, we were able to advocate for a 10% increase in government funding and 20% in Missouri Department of Mental health funding.

We enrolled 727 advocates into our advocate network, utilizing this network to engage a total of 92% of the Missouri House Budget and Senate Appropriations committees members, contacting them via phone calls, virtual meetings, and in-person meetings to educate them about Easterseals' mission.

We continue to expand our impact in Kansas, currently working on developing and soon implementing a new public policy strategy for this region. In FY22, in collaboration with provider organizations in the area, we met with 16 Kansas legislators to discuss our mission and expansion into the state.

Women's Giving **Collective**



Launched on January 1, 2022, the Women's Giving Collective is a group of Easterseals donors designed to empower and engage women in philanthropy and generate support for Easterseals. Inspired by a transformational gift made by philanthropist MacKenzie Scott to Easterseals in 2020, the group engages donors, affects positive change, and helps shape the future of our organization through strategic grant-making.

Each year, funds from the Collective will be designated through a grant process to support projects proposed directly by Easterseals staff members. Each January, staff will submit grant proposals for innovative and unfunded programs, and the Collective will come together to review submissions and designate funds.

All funds raised by the Collective will be matched dollar-for-dollar from a portion of the endowed Ms. Scott gift, magnifying the impact of Ms. Scott's incredible investment and that of each WGC member.

At the end of FY22, the Collective had raised \$18,756. The first grant approval process will begin in 2023.




