## Let's Go to School!

How Transition from ECI to the Local School District Works

The Individual with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) was created to ensure that all children with disabilities have available to them a free and appropriate public education as Links to Transition Resources

well as ensure that children with disabilities rights are protected. Through children with this. developmental disabilities, delays, or medical diagnoses may be eligible for Childhood Early Intervention (ECI) services. ECI

supports children and families from birth up to three years old. A child and family's individual addressed would be through needs an Individualized Family Services Plan (IFSP). Upon turning three years of age, children that will continue to need services and supports may be eligible for Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE) services. ECSE services are for children between the ages of three through five that have been evaluated and meet one of the 13 disability categories identified in the IDEA. There must be an educational need for school-based services eligible in order to be for ECSE. An Education Program Individualized (IEP) is developed for each eligible student that focuses solely on disability related needs. Not all children who are referred by an ECI program will qualify for Special Education services with the Local Education Agency (LEA). The LEA is defined as the local school district or charter school.

The transition process begins when a child is getting ready to move from one program to another, ECI to school based services (ECSE). At least 90 days before the child's third birthday a transition conference is held to address if special education services are needed. Parents of the child, family members, ECI Service Coordinators, Evaluation personnel, and a representative from the Local Education Agency (LEA), would be part of the transition conference team. During the transition conference, the team will discuss the rights of the parents/guardians, explain the referral process, steps, and timelines for a school-based evaluation, answer any questions that parents/guardians may have, and discuss possible placement options if the child is to be eligible for ECSE services. The entire transition process from beginning to end must be completed by the child's third birthday.

## Spotlight Story - Ricardo Gallegos, Jr.

About 20 years ago, little Ricardo Gallegos, Jr. (Ricky) was enrolled with the Easter Seals ECI program for speech therapy at the recommendation of his pediatrician. At the time, Ricky's mom, Amanda Casillas-Gallegos, was employed with San Antonio Water System (SAWS).

Between the experience she had

with Ricky and her own research, Amanda and Ricky chose to represent Easter Seals in the SAWS *Be Someone's Hero Charity Campaign*. In 2003, Ricky was the poster child for the campaign (pictured above left) and Amanda donated to Easter Seals every year through the same campaign while employed with SAWS. Amanda stated, the ECI program turned her son into a "chatterbox" and "I'll take all the chatter he has to give!"

What began as a speech referral to Easter Seals, became diagnoses of hearing loss, ADHD, dyslexia, dysphagia, and short-term memory loss. "I'm very appreciative that I found the information I did when he was young. I want parents to not be afraid of stigmatization. I'd rather know what's going on with my child than not," Amanda said. "I think speech therapy helped him so much and led him to be the man he is today." Ricky attended school in Edgewood ISD where he said math and science were "easier" than reading and writing, and he "struggled" with Spanish.

Ricky played the tuba for two years in his middle school band and four years in high school. He went on to letter in band and a construction group that volunteered with Habitat for Humanity. "He's always been inquisitive and willing to learn things," Amanda said. "He's also always wanted to volunteer and give back. I think those characteristics stemmed from his start at Easter Seals."

Post high school, Ricky attended Northwest Vista, which he said was an "amazing campus" in terms of the disability services on campus and professors who were "really nice" and willing to "go the extra mile to help out." He lived at home while attending Northwest Vista. Ricky graduated in May of 2020 with an Associates in Science.

Today, Ricky is enrolled at Texas A&M Corpus Christi working towards his Bachelor of Arts in Mechanical Engineering. He lives on campus and is on track to graduate in 2024. His village includes his family, supportive professors, and his on-campus accommodations. When asked about future goals, Ricky responded, "I want to do something I can build with my hands and work on things. Maybe HEB Creamery, Toyota, or back to where I started at Habitat for Humanity."

Where will your ECI baby be 20 years down the road? Only time will tell. Ricky's advice, "parents who know and learn about everything that's going on with their child help their child succeed. Stick with it," he said. "You've got this!"
