Last year brought exciting changes and opportunities in our centers and beyond. Our success was the direct result of both a collective and a collaborative effort of staff, donors, volunteers and families.

In Philadelphia, we renovated our new Allegheny Avenue location as well the Yaffe Center. The buildings went through significant transformations to meet the needs of all the students. They are a reflection of staff input and hard work. Both centers feature a gross motor room, which was designed by the physical therapy team. The Yaffe center has a new sensory room, which was designed by the occupational therapy team. Every piece of equipment was selected to provide therapeutic support for all the students. Through the generosity of individual donors, the sensory room and the gross motor room at the Allegheny Center were fully funded.

After several years of challenges facing in-person events, we were excited to reconnect with donors and volunteers in a more intimate setting. In November, we hosted our first annual Uncorked & Crafted at the Saturday Club in Wayne. The tasting event featured local fare and cocktails to appeal to the senses, while raising funds for the sensory room.

As staffing vacancies can impact the number of families we serve, we continued to prioritize recruiting and hiring the best candidates. We implemented a new recruiting software to improve both internal efficiency and external reach for open positions. Additionally, we continued to update and implement our salary ranges for current staff.

To continue to our effort to ensure that people with disabilities and their families have equal opportunities to live, learn, work, and play in their communities, we participated in a large collaborative effort to engage the disability community to vote in the Philadelphia mayoral election. Through a grant from the Lenfest Foundation, we worked with local organizations to raise awareness about the potential impact of voters who identify as having a disability, which is 25% of the population. The campaign also highlighted how local elections are critical as many of the issues facing the disability community are often decided through municipal government, including transportation, housing and job opportunities.

At Easterseals we continue to focus on and meet the needs of the community we serve through the support of a community that shares our passion. As the needs of the families who turn to us for services are ever evolving, we are focused on maintaining best in class services as well as growing our programs and services to meet the evolving needs of the disability community.










PLAY FOR PURPOSE CAMPAIGN


