The ESSC community celebrated the opening of the new Pyott Center in Santa Ana in June. The newly renovated center is located on the former site of the non-profit's corporate headquarters and was funded by a generous \$1.75 million gift from the David and Molly Pyott Foundation. Molly Pyott, an ESSC Board Member, and her husband, philanthropist and former CEO of Allergan, Inc. David Pyott, are long-time supporters of ESSC.

This state-of-the-art center will serve up to 200 individuals through on-site and community-based programs. The Pyott Center will provide their participants with the opportunity to become active members of the community by learning work-related skills and engaging in regularly scheduled volunteer work,

community service projects and other activities.

Nancy Weintraub, ESSC Chief Advancement Officer, said in appreciation, "Molly and David's extraordinary generosity of both time and financial support are unprecedented in the history of Easterseals Southern California and will make an enormous difference to the adults with developmental disabilities who will be served at this new site. We are incredibly thankful to them for helping us to expand our ability to serve more people at a new location in Orange County and Molly's continuing guidance as a member of our board."

Former Student Follows in Her Teacher's Footsteps

It's not every student who follows in their preschool teacher's footsteps, but that was the case for Child Development Services (CDS) Family Support Assistant Jacklynn Pacheco-Anaya.

When she was three-years-old, Jacklynn attended Para Los Niños, where Elena Flores was her preschool teacher.

"I don't have a clear recollection of her at that time, all the adults looked the same to me," explains Jacklynn, "but my parents said I was very shy and Elena soon got me dancing with the other kids."

Jacklynn and her family kept in contact with Elena over the years. When Elena joined the child development services staff at Easterseals Valley View Infant Center 10 years ago, Elena continued to visit.

Jacklynn says, "We had foster children with our family, and I would visit the school when we would drop them off. I enjoyed seeing Elena and all the teachers interact with the kids, and how all the staff were excited when the kids showed up for school. It brought back memories of how that made me feel comfortable when I went to preschool and made school a place I wanted to be every day."



When it came time to find a job, Jacklynn reached out to Elena for opportunities at Easterseals.

What's it Like Raising a Child on the Autism Spectrum? For Claire Khodara, it's

unexpectedly beautiful.

Excerpts from Clair Khodara's essay originally posted on Babe Hatch

Life is a path of self-discoveryat least that's what mine has been so far. Having children opened my eyes and heart to a world I didn't know existed, a world of endless opportunities for self-growth. Motherhood isn't easy, but it's worth it.

Six months into being pregnant with my second child, I was told by a pediatrician that my firstborn, who was then 2 years old, had autism and my second would likely as well. My whole world froze and my heart sank deeper than I ever knew it could. The isolation and depression was like nothing I had ever felt. I didn't know anyone who had autism, much

less a parent who had advocated for their autistic child.

In addition to Winston, I am mother to Constantin (2) and Olympia (1), I am a singer and use song to communicate throughout the day and to wind down during bedtime. My children are all exposed to different genres: pop, jazz, classical, lullabies, hymns, chants and more. I have seen incredible transformation in Winston through the music therapy we do at home and outside of the home with other musicians. Music stimulates him like nothing else.

Lullabies bring me back to a place of safety, protection, and love, where I can go each night with my children. That's why I created a lullaby album titled Modern Lullaby for parents and children to enjoy music together. The album includes covers from my favorite musicians, and an

original track entitled "There You Are," which I wrote for Winston at birth. Winston also has a singing debut on the album, and his voice takes my breath away.

November is National Veterans and Military Families Month

This month we honor our Veterans. Individuals like Sanjeeta.....

Sanjeeta Thomas, an Operational Specialist in the U.S. Navy and single-mother, had to leave active-duty service in early 2020 amid the pandemic. As the primary provider for her household of five, she needed assistance in finding employment to support her family. The Easterseals Bob Hope Veterans Support Program (BHVSP) team helped her create a solid resume, provided referrals to additional community resources, and opportunity! Sanjeeta is now working as a Community Engagement Support Manager with the Us4Warriors Foundation, supporting other Veterans. She also is completing the Registered Dental Assistant Program at PIMA Medical Institute and is expected to graduate later this year.

"It was a difficult and challenging time for me, dealing with my involuntary medical separation from the Navy and then facing unemployment as a single mother and primary provider for my family during a pandemic was terrifying," she said.

"With the assistance and support from the Easterseals Bob Hope Veterans Support Program (BHVSP) my family made it through the first year of the pandemic and we are now in a good place."



Established with a generous seed grant from The Bob & Dolores Hope Foundation's Bob Hope Legacy division, Easterseals Bob Hope Veterans Support Program has been providing one-onone employment and support resources to our US Veterans since 2014. To date, the program has helped support over 1,200 veterans and their families transition into civilian life feeling healthy and productive.
