Driver Assessment and Adaptive Driver Training Program

Providing driver independence for over 20 years



An avid golfer, Fran Mooney began his day like any other. Excited to play a round at his favorite golf course, he grabbed his clubs, hopped in the cart and headed out to play 18 holes. While traveling to the next par 3, Fran's cart hit a curb and he fell out, landing on the back of his head.

Fran sustained a traumatic brain injury and was in a coma for three weeks. He needed to re-learn how to walk and do basic tasks. Fran was determined and pushed through rehab like he was Tiger Woods at the 2019 Masters tournament. But there was one thing Fran hadn't mastered yet. To gain full independence, he needed to be able to drive on his own. Fran was referred to Easterseals Driver Assessment program and worked closely with Raechaell Corbett, MS OTR/L CDRS. Raechaell began by conducting a clinical assessment on a driving simulator and assessed skills needed to drive safely. Fran required Occupational Therapy to address his functional skills like visual scanning, visual attention, and overall cognitive processing speed in order to be able to participate in the



behind the wheel assessment. Fran tried a second time to pass the driver assessment and he did! He was finally ready to drive safely. Upon completion of the program, Fran said, "This was the last piece that I needed to fit in my puzzle. I am grateful to Raechaell for her knowledge and patience with me. She helped me get my life back." Fran has returned to work and is now able to drive on his own.

The Driver Assessment program is one of the only programs of its kind in the state of Connecticut, offering a clinical, behind the wheel assessment of the skills required to drive and adaptive driver training. Individuals may require a driver assessment because of medical diagnosis or at the suggestion of a physician who has indicated one may be unfit to drive. Individuals with physical, neurological, visual, and/or cognitive disabilities often participate in the driver assessment program to determine if they can drive, and if so, what tools they may need to drive safely. An assessment begins with a clinical evaluation completed by a Certified Driver Rehabilitation Specialist who evaluates a person's visual, physical and cognitive skills related to driving. If the appropriate skills are demonstrated, a behind the wheel assessment is conducted to evaluate one's ability to safely operate a vehicle on the road, utilizing adaptive equipment as needed.
