Club Lily

Suite 219 York, PA 17402 717.741.3891 The Club Lily residential camping experiences are getting off to a great start this year. The counselors at each month's Club Lily see a variety of campers with a wide range of abilities. When any of our participants is able to enjoy a new experience it is exciting and rewarding. Read below for Collin's story.

Collin has attended the Club Lily camps for several years. He is completely non-verbal, typically communicating with hand motions or vocalizing. The staff is diligent to make sure he feels included in all the activities by adapting them to his abilities. While he may not be able to grip a paint brush well, our counselors work with Collin to paint a face on a flowerpot by having him pick which faces he would like painted, Collin picks out the colors every step of the way, and the counselors check in to make sure that the pot is going through his artistic direction.



Collin is able to answer two option questions, and the staff uses their hands to represent each option for him to choose, whether it is an activity, or a question about how he is feeling. Collin is then able to make his own decision about whether to participate in an activity. During the most recent Club Lily Collin chose to zip line and climb the rock wall for the first time in many years! By giving him the ability to make his own choices, the counselors have seen Collin become more involved in all of the activities at camp. The other campers have even started to catch on to the two hand question system and started to interact with Collin more, asking him questions and helping him when he is exhibiting stimming behaviors.

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Project Beacon

These weekend camping retreats for the children of our military families provide opportunities for the kids to meet up with their peers that have similar life experiences. They are able to make friends, relax and try fun new experiences. During the April retreat, speakers from the American Red Cross gave presentations based on the different age groups. The youngest group received a presentation on fire safety, and the other two groups received presentations on mental health. During the mental health discussion, one of our campers exhibited great self-awareness and reflection skills regarding how stress affects her and how she deals with it. After the presentation, she spoke with her camp counselor about how she normally has a hard time addressing these feelings and that it felt good to talk about them.

Providing the space and resources for the children to learn, process and discuss their experiences allows them to feel safe. Trust is developed and the kids are able to share. Project Beacon is more than a camping trip, it is a retreat filled with a variety wellness opportunities.

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

Walk With Me Ambassador

The 2024 State College Walk With Me event is happening on Saturday June 8th at Talleyrand Park. Francis is the 2024 WWM Ambassador. Read below for Francis' story.

Francis is a sweet, smart, joyful kid. He has a big smile with dimples and jumps up and down with excitement. Francis is neurodivergent; he was diagnosed with

at age 2. After we struggled to find a daycare that could meet his needs, he started Easterseals at age 3. At the CDC he is fully included alongside a diverse group of peers including kids who have other disabilities and those who are typically developing. All of the students are learning that people have different strengths. At the center Francis receives speech therapy, occupational therapy, and other forms of evidence-based instruction and support. His verbal communication has exploded. He is learning to recognize and communicate his needs in a group setting (where all the social interactions and sensory input can become overwhelming at times). He is now able to interact with his peers as well as communicate when he needs a break.



"The teachers and therapists have been incredible, sharing with us about his days, taking the time to learn about his strengths and strong interests, and teaching him new skills. It's a wonderful feeling, dropping Francis off at a place where we know the teachers have such caring, positive regard for him—where he'll receive the educational experience he deserves—and where he happily runs inside most days. When we pick him up, he now tells us what he did that day. The sensory room and math and science center are favorites!" -Pamela, mom
