Megan's Full-Time Job

"Everyone comes in just a little bit shy. Megan didn't. She came in, excelled at every aspect of training and was very motivated to learn," beamed Larry Millard, Commercial Catering Manager, remembering Megan's first day in the LilyWorks Commercial Services Training program for adults with disabilities.

At the state-of-the-art commercial kitchen, Megan's training included preparing daily lunches for the workforce cafeteria and servicing the banquet and catering center. She learned food preparation, presentation, execution and customer service skills—hands-on training that prepared her for employment in the foodservice and hospitality industries. At the end of her 90 day training period, she was ready for a job.

Bob Glowacki, CEO, explains the need for such a program. "There are about 86,000 jobs that are unfilled in the state of Wisconsin but there are many people who—like Megan—are willing and excited to work. It can take us up to six months to find one individual a job. Our participants obviously have challenges so it takes a little while to find the right employer that has the culture that's ready to take someone in who needs a little more help and is accepting of their differences."

Megan enjoyed her time at LilyWorks. "It was a nice experience. I felt really good that I accomplished something," she said.

Soon after completing her training, Megan began a full-time job in foodservice with the Waukesha School District.

"My typical day I prep, serve the students, wipe the tables, and setup and break down the line. It's exciting," Megan explains.

Easterseals works with United Way of Greater Milwaukee and Waukesha County who places adults with disabilities in the LilyWorks training program.

Shannon Reed, United Way Income Portfolio Manager, added, "What I love about my job at United Way is that we get to connect great organizations like Easterseals to great people like Megan so she can work in the real world. One of the most important things about Megan getting a job is there's dignity. By individuals giving to the Community Fund we can have that next Megan that will become a change agent in her community."

Megan is a United Way success story. She learned marketable employment skills at LilyWorks and is excited about her new job and the independence it gives her.
