Internships Lead to Jobs

Chip Brewster, Roving Reporter for Fox6's Real Milwaukee, recently visited ProHealth Care Waukesha Memorial Hospital to learn more about our successful program, Project SEARCH. The hospital is one of Easter Seals three Project SEARCH sites in Southeastern Wisconsin and one of 300 sites worldwide. It is an exciting transition program for young adults with disabilities that offers internships within a business that immerses them in real work situations. Over nine months, interns work in three 10 week rotations with a combination of classroom instruction and career exploration to learn marketable transferable job skills.

Chip interviewed Project SEARCH graduate, Ben, who lives with Asperger's Syndrome, which can inhibit social interaction and verbal communication skills -- two things necessary in most workplaces.

"When I was with Project SEARCH, I worked in different positions and different departments of the hospital," explained Ben. "Anyone with a disability like mine...should have a program like this. It gives us a chance to help us to understand where we can go and what can we do."

Through his rotation in the distribution and central service receiving departments, Ben was offered full-time employment.

"Without it, I might still be living with my parents or living in a group home. Thanks to the employment I got at the Project SEARCH, I'm able to live on my own in an apartment. So it's really cool." - Ben

"We focus so intensely on a day to day basis, learning everything we need to be successful in a job," explains Collette Cottreau, Project SEARCH Instructor.

Chip also interviewed current Project SEARCH intern, Rachel, who lives with autism. She is the first intern to be placed in a wound care rotation, a responsibility and challenge she was eager to accept. "Just because you have a disability, doesn't mean you shouldn't get jobs. People should not treat you differently," said Rachel.

Other Easter Seals Project SEARCH sites include Children's Hospital of Wisconsin and Froedtert Hospital. Two more sites in southeast Wisconsin are also being considered.

Over 80% of our graduates have found community based employment in the last five years. Maybe we should start calling it Project SUCCESS!

Easter Seals at its founding has been about the protecting and advancing the lives of children in our communities from diseases like polio to developmental delays to autism. We know the first five years of life are critical to a child's success. But what about the moments before a child is born? What about the impact of emotional, physical abuse and neglect? What trajectory will that put a child on for their future?

That's what I heard at a meeting last April convened by the Thriving Waukesha County Alliance with 20 colleagues who focus on the needs of children and families. They were in the homes of an expectant mother, helping her to understand how her health impacted her child's health. I heard that Safe Babies Healthy Families could not

continue on as they were currently. Parents seeking help were being turned away due to a lack of capacity. Babies born drug-addicted were not getting help. Families were falling through the cracks. The agency needed a partner.

So, we talked, we thought, we met and we envisioned. We connected Easter Seals long standing tradition of protecting and advancing the cause of children with Safe Babies Healthy Families' mission to end the cycle of violence in families. We embraced Easter Seals commitment to "Make the First Five Count." With Safe Babies Healthy Families as part of Easter Seals, we will not only Make the First Five Year Count, we will help Moms to make the first months of life count for better birth outcomes, healthy babies and healthy families.

So, on January 1, Safe Babies Healthy Families became part of Easter Seals. Any merger is not without risk, challenge and potential opportunities. I want to thank the board members of Easter Seals and Safe Babies Healthy Families for their work and willingness to embrace all children so they are safe and healthy. A Mother's Story

At 22, I was a senior at Michigan State University with a 3.8 GPA. I was a star student in sociology and a McNair scholar who was seemingly well on my way to an elite PhD program. So why was it that just five years later, I was a clinically depressed, unemployed, college dropout and soon-to-be single mother of twins? After a lifetime of experiencing more downs than

ups, this was my lowest low. So I thought a lot about what brought me to that particular point in my life.

My childhood was filled with the devastation of abuse, neglect, bullying, poverty, divorce, and domestic violence. From a very early age, I found refuge from my home life at school. Not only was lunch my only decent meal of the day, but the classroom was the one place in my whole world where I felt confident—where I was happy. While my teachers



probably knew my family was poor due to the condition of my clothes and inability to bring in the needed school supplies, I didn't show any of the normal signs of abuse or neglect. I never had a sudden drop in arades or multiple absences. I never acted out, and there wasn't a single detention or suspension on my record. As a young girl, I clung to the belief that education would be my ticket out of the life that I was born into. That was the one avenue available to me and I planned on using it.

"I know a person's past, especially events from childhood, can have lingering effects for decades afterward."

I fooled myself into believing that I had escaped my past. When I went to my first prenatal appointment and found out I would be having twins, I struggled to believe that anything

> positive could come out of it. I just felt like I had hit rock-bottom. I knew from a very young age that I wanted to have children and give them a childhood a thousand times better than my own. By becoming a single mother, I was not off to a very good start.

That is the number one reason why I sought help from Safe Babies Healthy Families, and that is the number one reason I am grateful for all that I have received from the program. My case manager has developed a very personal, yet

professional relationship with both my children and me. She met the babies less than 24 hours after they were born. We have been meeting regularly since then. I refuse to allow my children to carry the burden of my mistakes, and I am determined to stop the cycle of poverty, abuse, neglect, and mental health issues that plagued so many members of my family. Every day the Safe Babies Healthy Families program brings me closer to being the one to change my childrens' would-be fate.
