Advocacy Awards

Presented by Boeing

Our inaugural walkathon, Walk With Me, at National Harbor raised nearly \$25,000 for all Easterseals DC MD VA programs. Walk With Me offered 1- and 3-mile options with ADA-compliant accommodations for walkers of all abilities.

Community partners played an essential role in the success of the event. Wegmans donated healthy snacks, Eat the Change brought plant-based treats, and Safeway administered free vaccines. Children's performers from Princess Parties DC delighted the children and DJ Flava kept the event rolling with lively music.

Child Development Centers

All four Child Development Centers received accreditation by NAEYC (National Association for the Education of Young Children), a distinction met by only 10% of childcare centers in the United States. We strove beyond this already elite recognition of high-quality to increase our teachers' and

In addition, six staff members earned a Registered Behavioral Technician certification to support our children with disabilities. As a result, our centers saw high morale, improved performance, and longer retention of staff.

Child enrollment and teacher hiring were major priorities as our centers recovered from the pandemic. We served 269 children this year, but want to reach even more children and their families. To do so, Easterseals invested in opening new Child Development Centers in the next few years.

Early Intervention

administrators' professional

development and credentialing.

Our Early Intervention team actively collaborated with parents of young children with developmental delays and disabilities to achieve outcomes set for each child. To meet these goals, providers incorporated early intervention services into children's everyday activities. The most commonly needed service was speechlanguage pathology, followed by physical therapy and occupational therapy. In total, we provided 4,179 hours of early intervention therapies this year. Of the children served, 70% had a developmental delay in communication, motor, self-help, cognitive, or social skills. We supported caregivers to encourage their child's learning of these developmental skills at home and in daily routines.

While 15% of enrolled children attended an Easterseals center and could receive early intervention in-house, the majority were elsewhere in the District of Columbia. Our physical therapists, occupational therapists, speechlanguage pathologists, and special instructors traveled to each child's natural environment - homes, community locations, playgrounds, libraries – to facilitate learning. Our team's dedication to visit with each child upheld our commitment to accessible, direct service.

Head Start & Early Head Start

Head Start opened a second permanent center and secured a third location for Early Head Start. This second fully licensed center offered 82 seats to children from low-income families in southern Prince George's County, Maryland. In response to families' need for Early Head Start in Washington, DC, we identified a third center to expand into Ward 5. Our initiative brought in a major \$600,000 grant from DC Mayor Muriel Bowser, who held a press conference at Easterseals Child Development Center in the city to announce the award and our plans to open 80 new seats

Our Head Start programs also enable us to strengthen partnerships to keep young children and families healthy. Children's screenings included vision tests from the Lions Club, dental cleanings from the Maryland Healthy Smiles Dental Program, and wellness checks from the University of Maryland School of Nursing. Families accessed nutritious food from Capital Area Food Bank, Snap Ed, UM Food Extension, and Fresh Farm. For growing families, we connected with organizations to help pregnant women plan for a healthful future with Easterseals.

Quality Improvement Network (QIN)

Easterseals collaborated with the DC Office of the State Superintendent of Education to strengthen family childcare providers' capacity to deliver high-quality education and support. This year, we developed an intensive capacity-building training institute for providers serving the District of Columbia. With our support, QIN connected more than 100 children and families to the services and tools needed to thrive.

my story:

The Harvin Family at **Early Intervention & Head Start**

Mr. Harvin is a dad of six children: two sets of twins (ages 4 and 3), a 2-year-old daughter, and an 8-month-old son. When the first set of twins was 2 years old, he was concerned because they weren't talking.

The family pediatrician referred them to the DC Early Intervention Program Strong Start. Mr. Harvin was connected to Easterseals DC MD VA as a Strong Start provider. The older twins were quickly assigned to an Easterseals speech-language pathologist.

Mr. Harvin was so happy with Easterseals that he requested the same therapist when his second set of twins had similar delays. Since aging out of the program, all four children have enrolled at their local elementary school.

Now, his youngest daughter is dually enrolled in Easterseals Early Intervention (with the same therapist) and Early Head Start programs. Mr. Harvin says she wakes up in the morning excited to go to Easterseals and is developing better than her siblings were at her age.

"As a single father, it's not been easy. Easterseals has been a big help," Mr. Harvin says. "The Head Start teachers are like my daughter's second parents. All my children are doing a lot better since receiving early intervention at Easterseals."

Mr. Harvin is a very active parent, serving as co-chair of the Head Start Parent Board. He regularly attends Head Start Policy Council meetings and volunteers at events. He even donates food and supplies to the teachers.



Adult Day Services

Adult Day Services (ADS) participants enjoyed the social, medical, and transportation benefits of center-based operations. Staff and participants continued to wear masks for everyone to feel comfortable with daily hugs, activities, and clinical care. Providing safe, fully in-person care sparked an upgrade to our curb-to-curb transportation service. A mobility project grant helped purchase transportation management software that streamlined driver assignments to bus routes. Its app also gave participants and their families real-time updates on their ADS bus's arrival and departure.

In addition to finding new ways to serve our 207 participants, we looked toward enrolling more adults with disabilities. Referrals came primarily from stronger outreach to case managers, and increased Medicaid reimbursements also attracted new enrollment.

In the fall, we lent our kitchen to celebrity Chef Robert Irvine for a cooking demonstration on healthful eating and a talk about supporting military families. Joining him in the kitchen were Easterseals children and adults from the Adult Day Services, Child Development Center, and Respite programs. Everyone was excited to meet Chef Irvine – award-winning host of "Restaurant: Impossible," founder of The Robert Irvine Foundation, and Easterseals DC MD VA Honorary Board member.

Easterseals Disability Staffing Network

Easterseals Disability Staffing Network (EDSN) refined its employment support for job seekers with disabilities. We tailored our approach to four essential steps individualized assessment, employment preparation, job placement, and retention support. Using this approach, we placed qualified candidates in long-term employment toward their career goals. EDSN identified employers that not only met these goals, but could also accommodate an employee with disabilities. These employers included Enterprise Holdings and Johns Hopkins University, with whom we built new relationships this year. By working with job seekers and employers, we increased the odds for a successful placement. Our continued partnership with Melwood, a nonprofit job staffing agency for people with disabilities, also helped ensure this mutually beneficial hiring process.

As an approved employment network, we also placed candidates exclusively from the Social Security Administration's Ticket to Work program – a free and voluntary program for job seekers receiving Social Security Disability Insurance or Supplemental Security Income.

my story:

Daniel at Adult Day Services

In 1999, Daniel's car hydroplaned into a wall, resulting in severe arm and foot injuries and then brain surgery. A second brain surgery in 2001 left him completely unable to work. After rehab doing physical, occupational, and speech therapy, Daniel went from using a wheelchair to a walker.

Daniel receives Social Security disability benefits and lives in a group home. He began looking for a day program to occupy his time. He was referred to Easterseals DC MD VA when his previous program closed.

In 2017, Daniel enrolled in Easterseals Adult Day Services. He takes the Easterseals shuttle to the center where he has three close friends who call themselves the "VIPs" and sit together in their "VIP lounge."

Wanting to save money for retirement, Daniel applied for a job at Safeway in 2022. His social worker at Easterseals helped with the job application and paperwork. The store manager saw beyond Daniel's disability and hired him as a courtesy clerk.

"The staff is great," Daniel says about Easterseals DC MD VA. "It's a special place to come. I work and come here and it's my R and R. Every Friday we do Zumba, dance, and it's the best." He encourages others to send their loved ones to Easterseals, calling it "a nice, safe environment" that welcomes people of all ages, races, and abilities.

Daniel balances his time between Easterseals and Safeway. He loves his job and plans to work at Safeway for years to come. His goal is to be on television to present the PGA Tour winner's check on behalf of Safeway.



The Steven A. Cohen Military **Family Clinic**

The Cohen Clinic marked a number of milestones during the fiscal year, including a celebration of its fifth year of service at Easterseals. Clients and their families came for cake, ice cream, crafts, and even a raffle. We were proud to mark our service to over 2,500 clients with more than 22,000 hours of therapy since opening our doors to the veteran and military community.

This year alone, the Cohen Clinic provided 7,422 hours of high-quality, accessible behavioral healthcare to 652 post-9/11 veterans, active-duty service members, their families, and caregivers. Robust outreach brought in these clients from Washington, DC; Maryland; Virginia; and West Virginia. To expand our reach into underserved areas, we hired an additional outreach coordinator with a grant from the Harry & Jeanette Weinberg Foundation. Local partners, such as Booz Allen Hamilton and Navy Federal Credit Union, also supported us by purchasing and assembling items for 550 mental health go bags.

Veteran Staffing Network

Throughout the year, VSN staff attended high-profile employment events, often as expert panelists, to promote the value of hiring veterans. VSN was also featured at the Aspen Institute's Project on Belonging and a Greater Washington Board of Trade panel discussion. Additionally, VSN and the Cohen Clinic were spotlighted in a "Solder for Life" three-part podcast about Easterseals services for the military community. Other efforts to share thought leadership from VSN included staff-written articles with insights for employers added to the VSN website.

For this year's 387 job seekers, VSN extended employment resources to include those without a military background. For veterans and military spouses, our career coaches helped leverage the skills acquired through military service to achieve career goals. Plus,

anyone could learn to boost job search success through our free Tuesday Talks webinars. These webinars and job hunt hints were regularly posted to the VSN Job Seeker webpage. Easterseals also worked to launch the MyCareer Toolkit app for mobile users everywhere to access job search support based on a VSN curriculum.

Homeless Veterans Reintegration Program*

HVRP helped veterans experiencing or at risk of homelessness reintegrate into the labor force. Veteran families were this year's primary focus. Initially designed for female veterans, the Homeless Female Veterans, Veterans with Children (HFVVWC) program added male veterans with families. Easterseals case managers worked with both female and male veterans to create an individualized employment plan detailing goals, strategies, and outcomes.

To address each veteran family's complex needs, HVRP worked to enroll the family in local support services. These services often related to housing, healthcare, legal matters, and transportation. This holistic approach to lift the family out of homelessness was fundamental for the veteran maintaining stable, long-term employment.

Little Warriors Child Development Program

We welcomed two new Little Warriors, the children of wounded warriors. Our program awarded scholarships, valued at approximately \$25,000 each, to these Little Warriors to attend Easterseals child development and respite programs. By caring for Little Warriors, we helped alleviate the many unique challenges and transitions faced by wounded warrior families.

my story:

Talha at the Cohen Clinic and VSN

Talha served in the U.S. Navy from 2003 to 2007 as a hospital corpsman, providing medical care to service members and their families. Following his military service, Talha transitioned to a civilian healthcare career. But when his employer lost its government contract, Talha was laid off.



Around the same time, Talha was a client at the Steven A. Cohen Military Family Clinic at Easterseals. Learning of his job loss, his counselor referred Talha to the Veteran Staffing Network (VSN) at Easterseals for job search support.

Talha set his sights on a project manager position because of experience simultaneously managing two projects, though he had never held that title. VSN helped him showcase his relevant skills, highlight his military service, and — most importantly — understand his worth in salary negotiations.

Talha landed a project management offer at a Fortune 500 company working on a Veteran Affairs contract to update medical records. VSN encouraged him to ask for a higher salary because of his direct experience in military healthcare. Talha successfully negotiated for an additional \$20,000!

"My career coach really helped me with the hiring process and resume review. Both VSN and the Cohen Clinic exceeded my expectations," Talha says. "I've shared my Easterseals experience with other veterans and military spouses looking for professional and mental health support."

Robert S. Wilson Community Respite Program, A Signature Program of the Robert Irvine Foundation

With support from the Robert Irvine Foundation, the Robert S. Wilson, Jr. Community Respite Program welcomed 31 new families since resuming in-center events one Saturday each month. Military, veteran, wounded warrior, and civilian families of children with and without disabilities enjoyed a day when caregivers focused on themselves and avoided burnout. Their children, matched with vetted volunteers, came to our Harry & Jeanette Weinberg Inter-Generational Center to engage in themed activities. Easterseals staff created exciting multi-sensory experiences for children of all abilities, including a reptile show, magicians, mad

science, interactive sports, fitness workouts, and hands-on crafts. More families joined in this year, especially first responder families and those from the Department of Defense. The increase in participants was made possible by a new core group of repeat volunteers, many from organizations like Boeing and Kearney, respectively.

Navy Exceptional Family Member Respite Care

In partnership with Child Care Aware® of America and the Navy Exceptional Family Member Program, Easterseals supported Navy families of children with moderate to severe disabilities in order for the service member to stay mission-ready. In the last year, this program gave specialized in-home care to 131 activeduty Navy families. Easterseals matched those parents with highly trained providers who managed the daily needs of their children. Feedback from the families repeatedly noted that their children were excited to see their provider, and providers attested to the positive impact of respite services.

Child Care In Your Home

Easterseals joined a Department of Defense pilot program, Child Care In Your Home, which provided fee assistance to eligible Navy, Air Force, Marine Corp, and Army families for full-time, in-home child care providers. We were able to serve 19 military families through this newly developed program.

Easterseals DC MD VA Secures \$900,000 for a New Community **Behavioral Health Clinic**

The FY23 Appropriations bill signed into law by President Biden secured \$900,000 for Easterseals DC MD VA to establish a mental health clinic for underserved children and adolescents in Prince George's County. This show of support helped draw attention to the vital need for these services.

Easterseals DC MD VA Joins Spanberger to Protect Airline Passengers with Disabilities

When Rep. Abigail Spanberger (VA 7th Dist.) called for better enforcement of the Air Carrier Access Act. Easterseals DC MD VA supported her letter to the U.S. Dept. of Transportation and cited an average of 28 wheelchairs damaged each day by airlines.

Easterseals Holds Its First Policy & Partnership Forum

Easterseals DC MD VA attended this inaugural forum, gathering Easterseals' 71 affiliates on Capitol Hill for the release of the Easterseals State of Disability Equity and Access Report. During the three-day event, Easterseals DC MD VA met with its Members of Congress to advocate for education, employment, healthcare, and transportation improvements for people with disabilities.


