
"The Most Beautiful Experience of My Life"

Chelsea's Boardwalk

Camperships provide financial assistance to individuals and families to offset the cost of a summer camp experience for people living with disability. In 2019, more than \$60,000 in Campership funds were raised, supporting nearly 125 campers!

Perhaps the most coveted award among counselors is the Squeaky Clean Award, given to the cleanest cabin. Counselors love this award because the winner gets a break from cleaning between camp sessions. Campers love the Big A Award, given to the cabin with the most camp spirit. Cabins work hard singing and cheering to show their enthusiasm for each other. Sometimes, cabins will get special, silly awards like Dancing Queens to celebrate their unique contributions to the magic of Rocky Mountain Village.

Friendship Lodge

This summer saw the opening of the new Friendship Lodge in the center of Rocky Mountain Village, near the fishing pond and outdoor stage. With 32 beds, the new Friendship Lodge is a fully accessible, 7,500 square foot residential building. During the summer, it will house campers with disability and summer camp staff. In the off-season, it will host private rental groups. In addition to the bunk rooms, Friendship Lodge also includes private bedrooms for counselors, a kitchen, living area and fully accessible bathrooms. Friendship Lodge features a variety of ADA finishes, high ceilings, beautiful mountain décor and picturesque mountain views.

Frontier Lodge Renovation and Expansion

Rocky Mountain Village is committed to providing on-site housing for its year-round staff of 12. The current housing available to staff is inadequate, both in terms of space and quality. To address this shortage, Rocky Mountain Village is embarking on a two-phase capital project. The first phase, the Frontier Lodge Renovation and Expansion, began in August of 2019. During this phase, Rocky Mountain Village will be remodeling the existing 600 square feet of space in Frontier Lodge, an original 1932 building, and adding 900 more square feet. The renovated and expanded Frontier Lodge will have an 800 square foot apartment to house 1-2 staff members. The remaining 700 square feet will be used for group activity space and storage. In the second phase, starting in 2020, Rocky Mountain Village will replace the A-Frame, a deteriorating staff residence, with a new, larger Staff Lodge.

Archery

It had been decades since archery was available at Rocky Mountain Village. Thanks to a collaboration with CSU Extension 4-H in Clear Creek County, archery returned to Rocky Mountain Village in 2019. More than 500 campers, ranging in age from 6 to 70 and living with a wide variety of disabilities, got to experience the challenge and fun of shooting a bow and arrow this past summer. Some campers spent hours at the range, practicing and improving, returning during every open activity period. Even campers with limited arm mobility were able to participate using the adaptive cross-bow setup. Many campers cited archery as their favorite activity this summer.

One camper living with a degenerative condition that impacts her mobility had this to say about archery this summer:

"Every day I take back something my disability stole from me. I used to love archery. The feeling of holding a bow in my hands [again] was unreal.

I felt powerful and strong and capable."
