

Restoring Excellence

Following years of collaboration with The Bridge Center, in August of 2022, its Board of Directors transferred operations of the 20-acre campus to Easterseals Massachusetts (ESMA).

Reopening The Bridge Center after its closure in 2020, required an energetic workforce, significant financial investment, and community support. The grounds and all the buildings on the property needed major repairs to safely welcome participants, staff, animals, and community members back on campus.

While we arrived at this destination *full of hope*, the outpouring of support and love from Bridgewater residents and surrounding communities, as well as long-time ESMA supporters and mission partners, provided the critical funds and volunteers to *jump hurdles*. These *barriers* came in the shape of taking down old paddocks, trimming overgrown shrubbery, removing debris from the pond, cutting fallen trees, painting worn fences, hauling heavy stones, replacing roofs, scrubbing floors and windows, installing playground chips, and so much more.

In January, ESMA launched **The Bridge Center Restoring Excellence 2023** campaign and set an ambitious community goal of raising \$300,000 to fund critical renovation projects, grounds restoration, and new programs. To date, our community has generously contributed \$92,000 in monetary and in-kind gifts and services directly in support of The Bridge Center.

Thanks to your financial support and volunteer effort, The Bridge Center is once again a bustling destination *full* of hope. Today, our fences corral grazing horses and our walls echo with the sound of children laughing and participating in a wide variety of recreational activities.

Our campus now offers adaptive riding and horsemanship sessions, as well as recreation programs for kids aged 7 through 16 that include arts and crafts, motor activities, cooking and baking classes, and physical games. In less than six months, The Bridge Center has enrolled more than 100 participants.

In a short span of time, The Bridge Center has brought together a community of passionate people with the common purpose of empowering people with disabilities. This beautiful property provides ESMA with a designated location to continually update and innovate programs in response to the evolving needs of our participants. Soon, The Bridge Center will offer programs for all ages; as young as six months old, all the way through the lifespan.

Although The Bridge Center has made significant progress since reopening, several capital renovation projects and new program offerings need your support. This fall, The Bridge Center will expand programming for participants of all ages with the introduction of classes in art, dance, music, and adaptive exercise. The

Equestrian Center will also host horsemanship opportunities for Veterans, adaptive carriage driving, and hippotherapy (a form of physical therapy using equine movement). As we plan ahead for 2024 and achieving our camp licensure, repair work on the swimming pool and pool house will be major renovation projects.
