



# The Oregon Money Management Program

*A little help can make a big difference . . .*

Financial security is more than simply having money to live on. It's also being able to understand and pay bills on time, manage credit, organize financial papers, and other financial tasks. Approximately 2% of adults need help managing personal finances due to mental or physical impairments. As one might imagine, the percentage increases with age. Without support these people are vulnerable to fraud and financial abuse. They are often isolated and living in fear of losing their independence.

The Oregon Money Management Program offers support to people ages 18 and over with limited incomes and assets who need help with money management tasks. Services are provided by trained and supervised volunteers who support the program in the following ways:

- Bill-Pay volunteers provide one-on-one assistance to individuals who remain in control of their finances but need on-going help to keep on-track. Budgeting, organizing financial papers, paying bills, banking, and help filling out forms are examples of how Bill Payer volunteers help their client
- Payee volunteers provide one-on-one assistance to individuals who do not have the capacity to manage their federal benefits such as Social Security, SSA Disability, Veteran's, and Railroad Retirement. Volunteers manage these federal benefits on behalf of the individual ensuring that basic needs are met and funds are protected.
- Office Aides help Regional Program Coordinators program operations including processing client and volunteer paperwork and data entry
- Monitor volunteers examine client bank statements looking for red flags and needed supportive documentation
- Team Leaders support program volunteers at program satellite offices

## **Program Safeguards**

- Program volunteers are screened to ensure suitability to work with vulnerable individuals
- Volunteers receive specialized training with ongoing support and supervision
- Personal and financial information is kept secure and in strict confidence
- Operating procedures are in place to protect program participants from loss and volunteers and program sponsors from liability
- Easter Seals Oregon protects client's funds from loss due to mistake or misuse by program staff or volunteers

## Volunteer Commitment and Flexibility

Program staff matches volunteers to clients based on the preferences of each. Volunteers spend 2-4 hours per month helping their client. Volunteers and clients agree on the dates, times and frequency of their meetings.

## Partnerships for Success

Easter Seals Oregon coordinates the Oregon Money Management Program Statewide in partnership with the Oregon Department of Human Services, local community service organizations, and community volunteers. As the State Coordinating Agency, Easter Seals Oregon is committed to expanding money management services throughout Oregon. Program funding is provided by the Oregon Department of Human Services.
