

Easterseals Associate Wins 'Talk To Me' Assistive Technology Device

In celebration of its 16th anniversary, Talk To Me Technologies—which provides assistive technology known as Speech-Generating Devices, allowing people with communication difficulties to "speak" in a synthesized voice—awarded six Wego 10A devices to speech therapists/pathologists around the country.

Natalie Jauregui, MA, CCC/SLP, ATP, an Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) Coordinator in Autism Services for Easterseals Southern California, submitted an essay on why her participants could benefit from such a tool. Natalie was selected as a winner (from among thousands of entries) for one of the devices, which cost about \$8,000.

Said Natalie, "One of Easterseals' goals is bridging the gap for accessibility and inclusive practices for everyone. It's all about being able to provide access to our clients ... who are really struggling with communication. It can be challenging to secure a device through insurance, so having options for our participants is impactful. The functionality of these devices is just amazing. These are most importantly speech-generating devices, but you can also use them to access your social media, send texts and emails, post on Instagram. You can connect to a Bluetooth and use it as a remote."

"This technology is pretty cool," she continues. "We provide services to a 61-year-old man who has alcohol

fetal syndrome, autism and an intellectual disability and has been completely non-verbal his entire life. We're very excited to work with him and this device to give him the opportunity to express himself. This tool is life-changing for people with disabilities."

Bruce Fleming, an AAC consultant for Talk To Me Technologies, said, "We are in a world of interactions usually conducted by speech. Someone who can't speak is at a huge disadvantage for connecting, getting their needs met and creating relationships with people. Easterseals programs reach so many people and we are happy to provide them with equipment that so uniquely improves the lives of people with disabilities."

Easterseals Southern California and Angels Baseball have once again come together to make disability inclusion a priority for their fans and guests. In addition to joint advertising efforts focused on changing the way people view disability, ESSC has advised on the following elements at Angel Stadium: A newly unveiled sensory-friendly room that can be utilized on game days and sensory-friendly kits that can be checked out by users and training sessions for game-day staff on best practices to interact with people with disabilities.

Sensory sensitivities are often experienced by individuals with autism and other disabilities. A sensory-friendly room offers a calm place to relax away from the noise and over stimulation at the ballpark. Sensory kits include noise-canceling headsets, sunglasses, fidget toys and hand fans to help individuals enjoy the game with their families.

"The Angels have thoughtfully created a safe and inclusive environment with their tranquil quiet room," added ESSC's Alyssa Kavner, MA, BCBA, VP, Clinical Training and Quality, and Monique Taylor, MA, OTR/L, Director of Clinical Standards, Occupational Therapy Autism Therapy Services. "With professional input from Easterseals, the collaboration developed a space that encourages regulation and calm while also offering stimulating activities and access to a variety of sensory input, such as play, coloring, fidgets and engaging visuals and textures. Guests visiting the stadium now have somewhere to support individualized needs as they take time away to decompress and re-engage, while guardians can continue to watch the game via monitor."

Autism Therapy Center Open House in Ontario

Families enjoyed a morning filled with fun crafts, art mural, game truck, DJ, photo booth and an Earth-Day inspired planting station. Remembering Judy Heumann,

the "mother" of the Disability Rights Movement

Judy Heumann—widely regarded as "the mother" of the disability rights movement—passed away earlier this year. Judy, who contracted polio at age two, was at the forefront of major disability rights demonstrations throughout her life. She helped spearhead the development and passage of disability rights legislation Section 504, the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), the Rehabilitation Act, and the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities. She also founded national and international disability advocacy organizations and held senior federal government positions.

Easterseals was honored to have had the opportunity to meet and collaborate with her and Nic Novicki on the Easterseals Disability Film Challenge. They also attended the Sundance Film Festival together to celebrate the premiere of *Crip Camp: A Disability Revolution* and she openly shared her knowledge with Easterseals and our Board of Directors through her book, *Being Huemann*.

Judy was a driving force in helping shape how we approach disability inclusion. She leaves an indelible legacy within the disability community and has paved the way for new generations to continue the work she started. She will be greatly missed.

Easterseals Southern California Advocacy on Capitol Hill
