



From Camper to Counselor

The impact of our camps is felt by our staff members too! Ivy Patterson has been a counselor for the Club Lily and Project Beacon camps for a year and a half and has chosen to pursue a career working with individuals with disabilities.

Ivy had her first experience with Easterseals Western and Central PA as a camper at one of the Project Beacon weekends in 2013. Both of Lily's parents were active in the military and her mother is still active in the National Guard.

What did the Project Beacon camps provide for you? Why did you enjoy them?

"Project Beacon camps provided me with a time to be around people who were in similar situations as me, such as parents being away for long periods of time. Camp also provided me with some lifelong friends that I cherish so much. I enjoyed camp the most for it bringing together random strangers that immediately got along and created lifelong bonds."

When did you first attend as a counselor? How did it feel to be on that side of the program?

"I started as a counselor in March of 2023. I was pretty comfortable, I felt confident I could use my knowledge on how my counselors were to help me be the best I could."

What do you find interesting and/or meaningful about working with the participants at Club Lily?

"The work I get to do at Club Lily is just really fulfilling, every interaction I get with a camper feels meaningful and it means a lot to be able to do this for them and to become closer while getting to know them. I find their stories to be the most interesting, these individuals are some of the strongest sweetest souls I have ever met and hanging out with them truly never feels like work.

I understand you plan to study for a career to work with individuals with a disability, what area?

"I would like to pursue a career in recreational therapy, it will be very similar to what I do as a counselor. I will create plans for recreation based medical treatment to maintain or improve an individual's physical, social, and emotional well being. My work at Club Lily directly impacted this decision, I had a counselor mention how naturally working with the campers seemed to come to me and it gave me the thought of making it my career. I was so nervous going into it but it was and still is the best job in the world."

Cumberland Day Campers Enjoy Weekly Themes

Our Day Campers have been enjoying games, crafts and activities with a new theme each week. Director Jordan Kriel has designed a full summer of fun with trained staff to assure a 1 to 3 ratio with our campers.



Camps are weekly Monday through Thursday 9:00-3:00 and half days are available.

Bowling Program Buddies



Travis, Paul and Jacob have been participating in the York area bowling program for over 10 years. Every Wednesday evening, they look forward to joining their friends and knocking down pins. These young men are seriously good bowlers! Recreational opportunities provide a chance for individuals with disabilities to socialize, enjoy physical activity and work off stress and anxiety. These times also give their parents/care givers a network connection and many families have been attending together for a long time.

The consistency of the program provides all the bowling participants a chance to improve their social skills and blow off steam. Paul's mother Penney says Paul looks forward to this Wednesday evening activity and has been participating since 2012.

"Paul has come so far with bowling, a lot of anxiety in past, especially in the beginning, lack of patience, noise etc. Today he is pretty laid back and pretty flexible with things. Example: Last night computers were not working so we were keeping score with paper, never would they have done that years ago. All of them handled waiting and computers came up after 3 frames, all was good."

Choosing the Child Development Center

The decision to send a child to the Child Development Center in State College is unique to every family. The mission to provide high-quality early-learning in an inclusive environment for children of all abilities appeals to families whose children have needs and those children who are typically developing.



We chose Easterseals because they provide a safe environment, good curriculum, and exposure to children that face some different challenges than our daughter does. We feel that by exposing her to this at a young age that she will normalize differences and continue to live a life guided by kindness as she gets older. - Curtis, father

James's Story



James is a happy 4-year-old boy with some speech and language delays. He was born at the beginning of the pandemic to parents Ashley and William, who had recently moved to State College. The isolation of being in a new town combined with the shutdown AND a newborn made for a rough start. When pandemic restrictions eased, James's parents looked for day care for him, but neither place where they eventually enrolled him ended up being a great fit for James. He was labeled disruptive and delayed, and the last facility wanted to hold him back.

In January 2024, James enrolled in the Easterseals Child Development Center in the younger pre-school class. The difference was noticeable in a matter of weeks. James's behavior and vocabulary had improved tremendously. He looks forward to going to school and has made friends with his classmates. His mom emotionally shared how several of his friends showed up for James's birthday party and how excited he was to see them. As a parent, knowing your child has friends, is included and accepted makes all the difference.


Fun in the Sun at Day Camp!
